John 5:5-9 \*Now a certain man was there who had an infirmity thirty-eight years. \*When Jesus saw him lying there, and knew that he aiready had been in that condition a long time, He said to him, "Do you want to be made well?" The sick man answered Him, "Sir, I have no man to put me into the pool when the water is stirred up; but while I am coming, another steps down before me." \*Jesus said to him, "Rise, take up your bed and walk." \*And immediately the man was made well, took up his bed, and walked. And that day was the Sabbath.

- Why specifically did Jesus select this man who was infirmed for 38 years?
- Why ask, "Do you want to be made well"?
- Whose faith played a role in the healing?

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John 5:10-13 10 The Jews therefore said to him who was cured, "It is the Sabbath; it is not lawful for you to carry your bed." 11 He answered them, "He who made me well said to me, "Take up your bed and walk." 12 Then They saked him, "Who is the Man who said to you, "Take up your bed and walk." 12 But the one who was healed did not know who it was, for Jesus had withdrawn, a multitude being in that place.

- How is it that Jesus was in the midst of this multitude of people and no one recognized Him?
- Who broke the Sabbath, Jesus or the man?
- Why did Jesus heal on the Sabbath and not a day before or after? Do you think it escaped Jesus' mind that it was the Sabbath?

John 5:14-18 <sup>14</sup> Afterward
Jesus found him in the temple,
and said to him, "See, you
have been made well. Sin no
more, lest a worse thing come
upon you." <sup>15</sup> The man
departed and told the Jews
that if was Jesus who had
made him well. <sup>14</sup> For this
reason the Jesus persecuted
Jesus, and sought to kill Him,
because He had done these
things on the Sabbath. <sup>17</sup> But
Jesus answered them, "My
Father has been working until
now, and I have been
working." <sup>18</sup> Therefore the
Jews sought all the more to kill
Him, because He not only
troke the Sabbath, but also
said that God was tils
Father, making Himself equal
with God.

- ► How is this healing different from the healing in Chapter 4?
- How did the Jews know that Jesus' comment of being the Son of God actually infer equality to God?
- What would happen if God did nothing on the Sabbath?

John 5:19-20 <sup>17</sup> Then Jesus answered and said to them, "Most assuredly, I say to you, the Son can do nothing of Himself, but what He sees the Father do; for whatever He does, the Son also does in like manner. <sup>20</sup> For the Father loves the Son, and shows Him all things that He Himself does; and He will show Him greater works than these, that you may marvel.
